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**Ohio EPA Requests Recognition of Improved Air Quality in Dayton;
Public Hearing to be Held May 3**

The State of Ohio plans to ask U.S. EPA to officially recognize that air quality in the Dayton area meets the 1997 federal fine particulate standard.

An Ohio EPA public hearing to take comments on the proposal will be held on May 3, 2011. The hearing will begin at 1:30 p.m., at Ohio EPA's Southwest District Office, 401 E. Fifth St., Dayton.

Air quality data from the years 2008-2010 show that the Dayton area is meeting the 1997 national fine particulate matter standard. When asking for redesignation, states are required to demonstrate that the metropolitan area will be able to maintain compliance with the fine particulate standard for 10 years. Current national, state and local air pollution controls to limit particulate matter-causing emissions will enable the area to maintain the air quality. These include lower emissions from coal-burning power plants, additional controls on diesel-powered vehicles and enforcement efforts.

The proposed redesignation request affects Clark, Greene and Montgomery counties.

The national fine particulate standard regulates tiny particles, about 1/30th the diameter of a human hair, that can lodge deep in human lungs. Particulate matter has been associated with health issues such as heart attacks, chronic bronchitis, asthma attacks and missed days of school and work.
